Parent-Teacher Conferences

Thank you so much for attending your child's conference. It is critical that we work as a team to ensure your student's success. I encourage you to continue to stay in contact with your child's teacher, particularly if there are any concerns. Call before or after school, send a message in your child's planner, or leave a message with someone in the office and we'll pass it on to the teacher. The teacher can then make an appointment to keep current on your child's progress. We ask that you don't come during their instructional time. This time is dedicated to teaching and focusing on your child and the other students in the class.

Parents are always welcome to make an appointment to talk to me in the office. Sometimes, it is more efficient and effective to meet with me, the teacher, and anyone else needed, all at the same time. Making an appointment helps to get everyone together at one time.

It's that time of the year...

As the cold weather settles in we see an increase in the incidence of illness. As a reminder, we are working to decrease our student absences and tardies. Please keep your child(ren) home only if they are running a fever or if they are vomiting. Otherwise, we want them to be in school so they don't miss critical instruction. If a student misses 3 days of school, that is equal to 18 hours of instruction that is missed! We want your child to experience all kinds of success! Success is much more difficult for your student if they are frequently absent. We also discourage taking vacations on school days. Although we value family time, it is difficult for your student to catch up when they are not in class. Too many absences and the student can be enough behind to cause them lots of frustration and anxiety when they return to school.

Illnesses in our school can spread very quickly to other students and to our teachers and staff. It is important to teach your student to wash their hands frequently. We encourage students to wash before and after recess and lunch and of course, after they use the restroom! Please call the school when your child has is absent for any reason. If your child has been seen a doctor and been diagnosed with strep throat, pink eye, the flu or any illness, we ask that you bring a note from your doctor. This helps us so much in working to keep illnesses and our absences to a minimum. Thanks for your support!

It's not only children who grow. Parents do, too. As much as we watch to see what our children do with their lives, they are watching us to see what we do with ours. I can't tell my children to reach for the sun. All I can do is reach for it, myself.

1. Self-Regulation-the ability to regulate emotions and remain resilient: not subject to temper tantrums and able to survive reasonable set backs.
2. Empathy-being able to imagine things from another person's perspective: to understand where they are coming from.
3. Persistence-sticking to things even when they are difficult.
